Abstract

It is well known that organisms adapt their environments to increase their chances of survival, a process known in biology as "niche construction". This workshop tries to understand the causes and consequences of niche construction by human beings. Social forces (such as politics, economics, technology, and culture) have joined natural forces (such as climate and ecology) in shaping niches for people and companion species. This workshop will examine the idea of human niche construction on a theoretical level and apply it to case studies, such as the growth of cities. Our aim is to see how the idea of human niche construction might lead to new insights into the ways in which people and environments have shaped each other over time.
