Abstract Toxic landscapes are ideal places to study multiple and overlapping time and space

regimes. Toxins, such as heavy metals or radioactive molecules, can mark landscapes and their inhabitants for generations or centuries while also imprinting on the dominant framework of industrial clock-time. Further, the very same material can be considered toxic or non-toxic depending on their location. It may be hazardous waste in one country and recycling material in the next. The workshop Hazardous Timescapes seeks to understand human-environment relationships through the lens of multiple overlapping time, space, and body regimes as they have (and continue to)

play out in toxic landscapes.
