Abstract Warfare seldom affects humans alone. While inflicting devastating effects on

societies, armed conflicts also shape economic, cultural, sociopolitical, and ecological transformations. As violence territorializes, armed conflicts begin to affect the ecologies and livelihoods that once sustained them. Environmental transformation thus emerges as an inextricable correlate of human conflict. With the dawn of the Cold War, the environmental impacts of human conflict unfolded alongside the same geopolitical trends that engulfed the Global South. Decolonizing movements, querrilla warfare, rural insurrections, and other forms of intrastate conflict developed

from within ecologically fragile areas and eco-sensitive zones, including savannahs, valleys, watersheds, islands, mangroves,

forests, plateaus, and jungles.
