Osogbo Main Campus – College of Health Sciences; College of Science, Engineering and Technology








A BRIEF ON RCC.



The Rachel Carson Center for Environment and Society (RCC) is an international center dedicated to the study of environment and society from a wealth of different disciplines and international perspectives. A nonprofit institution, the RCC was founded in 2009 as a joint initiative of Munich's Ludwig-Maximilians-Universität and the Deutsches Museum, funded by the German Federal Ministry of Education and Research as a Center for Advanced Study (Käte Hamburger Kolleg). The RCC features graduate programs: a structured doctoral program "Environment and Society" (ProEnviron), an international doctoral program "Rethinking Environment" (IDK) in cooperation with the University of Augsburg, an MA certificate in Environmental Studies, and a newly introduced MA in Environment in Society. The Center hosts numerous research projects, funded by the German Research Foundation (DFG), the European Research Council (ERC), the Volkswagen Foundation, the Federal Ministry for Research and Education (BMBF), and others. It also hosts visiting scholars, international Landhaus Fellows, and visiting doctoral students.

Our namesake is the American biologist, nature writer, and environmentalist Rachel Carson, whose writing raised awareness worldwide about threats to the environment and human health. The Rachel Carson Center offers a variety of positions from fellowships for senior scholars to internships.

A BRIEF ON ROSA LUXEMBURG STIFTUNG (RLS)



The Rosa Luxemburg Stiftung is a political education institution with offices in Africa, the Americas, Asia, Europe and the Middle East. The African Network of Environmental Humanities (ANEH) is a new multidisciplinary scholarly association, which aims at promoting environmental humanities scholarship in Africa. ANEH is composed of researchers in the humanities, social sciences and the sciences, who share a common passion to explore and understand through the prism of the humanities the nexus between human societies and the environment. The Network, currently funded by the Rachel Carson Centre for Environment and Society (RCC), emerged to fill a lack of environmental humanities scholarship in and about Africa on the global stage. ANEH aims to narrow the gap by building and sustaining a community of researchers dedicated to studying African societies and their environments.

The ANEH, with the generous support of the Rachel Carson Centre for Environment and Society, announced its presence during the international conference of the African Studies Association of Africa (ASAA) held in 2015 at the University of Ibadan, Nigeria. At the conference, ANEH hosted a panel on "Discovering Environmental Humanities: Recovering the Environment in Africa and the African in the Environment." Panelists presented a range of empirically informed papers on diverse aspects of the environment, dovetailing with the theme of the conference: "African Studies in the 21st Century: Past, Present and Future."

At the event, John Agbonifo traced the genesis of the idea of the ANEH to RCC director Christof Mauch and the moral and material support of the RCC.
