

<u>Call for Applications - Workshop</u> Defining and Using Aesthetics in the Environmental Humanities: An Interdisciplinary Experiment

Summary:

We cordially invite researchers from any disciplinary background and career stage interested in aesthetics and/or the environmental humanities to our upcoming workshop. Attendees will participate in in-depth discussions and engage in collaborative exercises, all with the aim to increase our collective understanding of aesthetics as an analytical category and its application to practical contexts. No specific research experience in aesthetics or abstract submissions will be required for participation.

To kick off the workshop, Professor <u>Emily Brady</u> (University Texas A&M) will deliver an opening keynote titled "**Planetary Aesthetics and the Environmental Humanities**". This will be a public event, taking place <u>online</u> on the preceding evening: <u>10 April, 17:30-19:00</u> <u>CEST</u>. Registration is open to all (even those not taking part in the workshop) via <u>Eventbrite</u>.

The workshop itself will take place in the LMU main building on <u>11 April, 09:45-17:30</u>. It will conclude with a closing statement by Professor <u>Sonja Dümpelmann</u> (LMU/RCC). Afterwards, all workshop participants are invited for dinner. The keynote and workshop will both be conducted in English.

Abstract:

Historians, sociologists, anthropologists, and other scholars broadly aligned with the environmental humanities have built up a sophisticated set of tools with which to examine the values at play in our ways of knowing, appreciating, and engaging with environments. The same scholars often preach the value of interdisciplinary research and collaboration. The organisers of this workshop believe that an essential step towards interdisciplinarity is the creation of common understandings of key concepts employed across disciplines. For scholars working on environmental issues in particular, developing an interdisciplinary understanding of aesthetics is particularly important, because it speaks to a dimension of the environment that the Earth and climate sciences have largely ignored or struggled to incorporate in their models (Warde et al, 2018, 133). If, as Warde, Robin, and Sörlin suggest, environmental humanities scholars want to integrate their expertise with the expertise of such scientists, then having a common framework for understanding and using aesthetics to bring to the table is crucial (Warde et al, 2018, 171-2).

This interdisciplinary workshop aims to bring together researchers interested in aesthetics as an analytical category in the environmental humanities, as well as those broadly interested in the values of climate and environmental sciences. It will build on recent work on aesthetics as an interdisciplinary category (Ryynänen and Somhegyi, 2023), as well as philosophical discussions concerning environmental aesthetics and climate change (Brady, 2023; Mikkonen, 2022) and the role of scientific knowledge in our aesthetic appreciation of nature (Turner, 2019). Most importantly, it will offer the opportunity for face-to-face exchanges and hands-on collaboration between researchers from various disciplines and with various research interests. We not only hope to allow participants to develop familiarity with topics of interdisciplinary interest, but also to strengthen the connections between different departments in and around the region.
